



Total Admissions - Fiscal Year Comparison: FY '22: 5920 **FY '23 Q1–Q2**: 3245 (Variance ↑ 326)



Lung Rescue Unit (LRU) Occupancy Rate









Interhospital Transfer Volume










Shock Trauma Actual Length of Stay









Hyperbaric Chamber Dive Hours










Organ Donation Rate:



- Donate Life Cheer Cart mobile cart to units educating staff on donation topics.
- BRA Day utilize Donate Life Cart to travel to units and educate them on the generosity of skin donors and how skin donors provide the skin for women to get their breast reconstructed following a mastectomy. One skin donor can help up to 5 people with breast reconstruction.
 - National Donor Sabbath Weekend (Left)— observed annually two weekends before Thanksgiving, from Friday through Sunday. This three-day observance seeks to include the days of worship for major religions practiced in the United States. During National Donor Sabbath, faith leaders from many religions, donor families, transplant recipients, and donation and transplantation professionals participate in services and programs to educate the public about the need for organ, eye and tissue donors.



First Aid Rally for the Boy Scouts:

October 15, 2022

The STC Simulation Center designed 8 scenarios to correlate with BSA's First Aid Merit badge and Basic Scouting Skills for rank advanced to include how to handle:

- Exposure to naturally toxic plants such as Poison Sumac, Ivy, and Oak
- Household Poisoning (ingested)
- Heat Exhaustion and Dehydration
- Ground level falls with forearm and ankle fractures
- An impaled object
- Bleeding Control with direct pressure and bandages
- Anaphylaxis and how to use an Epi Pen
- Basic Water Rescue with Hypothermia treatment

The training occurred at the Baltimore County Fish and Game Commission site where scouts camped for the weekend and had a CPR demonstration by local VFD. We used our debrief time to determine the scouts would do a focused lesson on splinting with slings and swaths later that afternoon after Baltimore County FD presented.

STB Training for Wilderness EMS Colleagues at MSAR:

October 23, 2022

16 of their members attended and brought 5 family members with them (21 total attendees). After the traditional 1 hour STB course from the ACS they participated in 2 simulations were they could practice their skills based on coming across injured people that were hiking. 9 of the 21 in attendance are EMS providers. 1 of the youth attending is receiving high school credit for the course.
